Synopsis

Mining Corporation Lake was stocked with brook trout up until 1965. The 1994 lake survey found a large population of yellow perch and white suckers in the lake, however, no trout were caught. The survey also reported that there is very little habitat for brook trout in the lake and the lake would only be suitable for a species such as splake. As a result splake are currently stocked into the lake every second year. The success of this stocking is unknown.
