Synopsis

Cain Lake is situated in Wood Township and is between the Severn River and Mosquito Lake. Largemouth bass were first reported in Cain Lake in the 1968 lake survey. Smallmouth bass were not reported in the lake until the 1991 lake survey. It is likely that both species of bass were introduced into the lake via the Severn River. The 1968 lake survey also recorded a population of lake whitefish in the lake. It is unknown, however, if this was an identification error or a population actually existed in the lake. IT seems more likely that he whitefish are actually cisco (lake herring).

The lake is surrounded by private land, however, access can be obtained via the Severn River.
